- 1. A **champion** for the cause of vulnerable children
- 2. A **trained volunteer** who connects the church and families together through ongoing support and resources
- 3. A leader of a Family Advocacy Ministry who wants a front row seat to what God is doing.

The role of an **Advocate** is to unleash the potential in their church. God is already at work in the hearts of church members. Advocates create the space and place for congregants to respond to the call God has placed on their hearts.

AN ADVOCATE IS SOMEONE WHO:

- Wakes up with the needs of vulnerable children on his/her heart and mind.
- May be a former or current foster or adoptive parent or anyone who has a heart to serve families.
- Serves as a volunteer or staff member at the church.
- Works well on a team.
- Is able to delegate tasks to other leaders or volunteers.
- Leads others well.
- Inspires and encourages volunteers.
- Can dedicate 2-4 hours a week (average for new Advocates).
